My younger daughter, Aurora, is 24 years old. She suffers from serious mental challenges. Her intelligence is equivalent to a two or three years old child. Besides, she suffers a number of physical illnesses. For instance, she would have seizure for no apparent cause. The most incomprehensible thing is that when she drinks plenty of water, her blood will get diluted and she will lose her consciousness.

While ordinary people take medication when they are sick, and the medication will be gradually drained away from the body, Aurora's body handles medication in an opposite way. The medication stays in her blood and would not be drained away. As a result, she will be intoxicated by the medication. It is a huge challenge to our family to bring Aurora up. Since we cannot give her any medication when she is sick, the only thing we can do is to pray to God for the healing. Having conducted numerous researches and studies on her, even the specialists from Sick Kids Hospital could not find out the cause and the cure for her.

Aurora is always under great stress mentally. Other than autism, she was diagnosed as hyperactive and emotional disorder. She hits people when she is approached. She pushes and throws things around, including food and drinks on the table. As a result, she cannot communicate with others, and let alone of socialization. The biggest pity of all is that she really likes to play with other kids. Unfortunately she would start hitting them when they come close to her. How could it be possible for anybody who would want to play with her? This makes her, my wife and myself very sad. I believe that it is very hard for my brothers and sisters in Christ to understand the challenges we face continuously on even the basic daily routines. It is a very difficult task for families to raise children with special needs. It would have been a blessing from God, if there were one morning when there was no spill of

milk from the breakfast table. It would be beyond comprehension for an ordinary family to understand these challenges.

I do not mean to complain when I talk about all these. I look back for the past twenty years after Aurora was diagnosed when she was three. I have so many different experience, thoughts and feelings. Among them, I would like to share two things with you.

Firstly, I believe that a lot of parents with children with special needs would ask a religious question. If it is a blessing from God or a curse to have a child with special needs in a family? This is a realistic question. Honestly I do not want to simply say that it is a blessing. Because if I were asked to start my life all over again with choice would I want such a girl with special needs. I would say "no" and who wouldn't.

However having been through the last twenty years, I feel that it is not a curse but a "special blessing". How could it be? My older girl is very smart. She does well in school. This is a very extreme contrast in our family. Aurora cannot even hold a pencil or a pair of chopsticks steady. I have started to realize that the plan and the blueprint that God designed for each one of us, and the "success" each one of us achieves, is so different from the ones we, ordinary people, would think. We measure success by school report cards, by career and by wealth. However children like Aurora cannot go to school and they are considered "useless". Nonetheless God sees us from the perspective of the eternal horizon and His master plan. When God measures our "usefulness", He really finds no major deviation amongst us. It is because that no matter how well we do, we are so far from His glory and His wisdom anyways. Therefore the way we measure our intelligence humanly really means nothing to God.

On the other hand, God appreciates how thoroughly we live out His plan and how well we use unique opportunities that He gives us to bless others. Perhaps this concept is a bit abstract. Take the pawn and the rook in a chess game as examples. The rook seems very powerful and capable because it can move swiftly and far. On the other hand, the pawn seems slow and dull because it can only move one step at a time. However you know that the pawn is often the determinant of the winner or the loser of the game. God does look at the world as the entire chess game. He does not look at the rook or the pawn individually.

I believe that Aurora brings to our family a tremendous change in our spiritual live. I was told that there are brothers and sisters in Christ who love to listen to my sermons during Services as it helps them to grow spiritually. In fact it is Aurora who gives me tremendous ideas for my sermons because I have experienced a great deal when I bring her up. Without her, I am lack of the experience and I cannot give such messages. The part in the sermons that really touches hearts is not the knowledge, nor the doctoral degrees. What doctoral degrees can do is only for people to brag about themselves and to earn respect from others. People's life will only be influenced by the encouragement brought by the tearful success in the struggle and in the searching for the way out of the pain.

The source of my pain comes from Aurora. Without her, the pawn, I would have no such experience. This is God's grace to let me have Aurora and she is the reason for the good chess game that I have been playing. As such my entire life and my service to God have been blessed. From this perspective, the presence of Aurora is very valuable and a treasure to us. She is a real blessing and not at all a curse. I have learned a lesson here. Do not look at what she cannot do. Rather, it is important to look at the plan that God designed for her life and look at her through the things that God has done through her.

The second thing that I would like to share with you is my life in the Christian community. In the past sixteen years, I have lived in Canada. I have been to several churches. In these communities, the children with special needs have received plenty

of encouragement and acceptance. I really appreciate the brothers and sisters who have offered their love to my family. Frankly speaking, Aurora is hardly loveable. Many people have approached her in the past and they got scared because she would suddenly hit people hard for absolutely no reason. However, I am touched by the love and acceptance shown to Aurora by brothers and sisters from different churches, including RHCCC.

There are some godly parents who would ask their children to play with Aurora. These poor innocent children would get hit by her and run to their parents crying. They would explain to their children that Aurora was sick and ask them to understand, to accept and to care for her. I am very touched and very thankful to them because they do not see this as a burden. Rather they feel that we are all parts of a body in Christ and we have the duty to help each other out whenever there is a need. As a pastor, I would like to emphasis that the weak ones in our church should always be the ones get care for and it is our responsibility, not our burden. This should be the rule of our church.

There have been a lot of brothers and sisters who have helped Aurora. Each one of them has been willing to join our family struggle and to care for her. There are a number of them from RHCCC and they have become our best friends. Now some of their children are in universities or are already doing well in their career. I treasure the memory of those who got hit by Aurora about 10 or more years ago but still stayed on as her friends and played with her. As for Aurora, it is unbelievable that she can also keep the memories of the old days by names when those friends played with her, such as "Rachael", "Ruth", "Terri", "Connie" ... As a matter of fact, children with special needs understand and appreciate those love them dearly and realize those despise them like trash. They are very sensitive to this and remember well the names of those loving ones. It seems that they are holding a mirror to reflect the true love and sincere care from people in the world. I believe that God has given great blessing to my family. Having lived in Toronto for the past twenty years and having been in various churches, I have met very loving brothers and sisters. I sincerely appreciate all of them. I also believe that if we can support these families with children with special needs, God knows and remembers our effort. The effect will be long lasting.



Postscript

This February (in 2008), Aurora got acute pneumonia and was admitted to the hospital. After twelve days, she passed away. She finished her life of 26 years. We did not anticipate her sudden departure. The grief that Renee and I experienced was much deeper and lasted longer than we thought. It was difficult for me to take it when people tried to comfort us saying (although I knew that they did not mean harm), "Now that Aurora is gone, perhaps it is a good thing, at least your burden will be lightened." Is it true? It may be true in terms of the daily routines in the days to come. However, emotionally Aurora has left us with a deep black hole. It is so deep that our emotion has fallen to a point so low that even surprises us.

Two months have gone by, however, whenever we hear her name or see her pictures, we start crying again. Finally Renee has figured out the reason for this emptiness in our hearts. Aurora was a 26 years old "big baby". Intellectually, she had never grown to be an adult. She did not have the ability to survive or to live independently. She was totally dependent on us emotionally and this also prevented us from helping her to be independent. She was different from a normal child, who started to become an independent individual at the age of three or four. When they grow older (especially during adolescence), they gradually keep their emotional dependence away from their parents, who have no choice but to let go. As for Aurora, we did not go through this process. The dependency of a normal three year old has lasted for 26 years

for us. Now if a three-year-old child passes away, it certainly means a lot of pain for the parents based on the loss of their close relationship developed within three years. But for us, we are talking about 26 years! The emotional interdependency and 26 years of bonding is now being cut off. Our hearts are broken! The face and the voice of this 26-year-old baby have been imprinted deep down in our lives. Up till now it seems that Aurora has not left us, she is still dear to our hearts.

On the second day after Aurora passed away, I looked out the window and saw the sun shinning on the snow left from the storm the night before, I wrote a letter to my dear daughter. Here is what I wrote:

See You Again, Aurora! (1981-2008)

My beloved Aurora,

At age 26, you should have been full of youthful vitality, balancing romantic love and an exciting career. But in the midst of this festive season, the Lord called you back to our home in Heaven.

I remember the day when you, at two and a half years old, suddenly had a seizure and scared the living daylights out of me. All I could do was to hold your tiny body close to me. Then, yesterday, I sat by your bed and watched helplessly as you struggled to draw each breath. For the past 24 years, I have repeatedly asked this question: if some people were born to suffer all their life, what is the meaning of their living?

Then I thought of the life of Jesus Christ. Was He not born to suffer? Didn't He die in the most painful way imaginable? I decided to remain silent.

Once, at a meeting with some seminary students, I was asked to name three theologians who had had the greatest impact on my life. I listed Hudson Taylor, the great missionary who founded China Inland Mission; and then, the Chinese theologian, Watchman Nee. But to everyone's surprise, I concluded by saying, "The third person is my daughter, Aurora, who is severely mentally challenged." Yes, my Aurora, in the eyes of this world, you were a handicapped person who couldn't even pick up a pencil to draw a circle. Yet God deliberately chose you and brought you into my life to teach me valuable lessons that I could never have learned from all my doctorate studies.

In the ancient East, a wise man once told his students, "Today I'm going to introduce my teacher to you." Everyone was anxious to find out who was the great teacher of this bright and knowledgeable man, but the wise man only took a small piece of stone from his pocket and said, "This is my teacher." While all his students were puzzled, the wise man continued, "One day, when I was in a hurry on my way to deliver a lecture, I suddenly felt a sharp pain under my foot and found a pebble in my sandals. I stopped and got down on my knees in order to take it out. As I stopped and looked around, I suddenly discovered how beautiful the scenery around me was. A little white flower next to me caused me to realize how brilliant life could be. Previously, I had rushed along on this path, but this tiny pebble caused me to pause on my way, and gave me the opportunity to take a good look at life. Now you can see why this tiny stone turned out to be my teacher!"

My dear Aurora, you're the small pebble in my life. When I was searching for fame and status, the difficulties and challenges you brought to my life and your physical weakness compelled this ambitious father to stop and reflect on his life again and again. Only then could I learn to understand the hurts of people and appreciate human dignity. Thank you, my dear child! You brought me back from going astray in my pursuit of success and achievements. Your genuine smiles and your tears without pretense constantly encouraged me to live an authentic life. Whenever I

think of your pure and simple life, I remind myself: do we really need sophisticated entertainment in order to live a life of joy and contentment? Thank you, my child, you're my great teacher!

Aurora, I have always believed that you were an angel, a suffering angel, sent by God – though you suffered so much in this world, your beauty and purity never changed. Now that you have fulfilled your mission on earth and returned to the loving arms of our Heavenly Father. My girl, your daddy is very blessed – for he has had the honor to take in an angel!

I can't stop missing you. My heart is broken. But when I think of your smiling face in heaven, I can smile too!

Now we are living every day full of God's grace. We are active in church activities, such as cell group and Bible study. We enjoy the sharing, the support and the care amongst the brothers and sisters in Christ. Erin can sit quietly during our Bible study and watch the other children play. This is something we could not even dare to imagine. This is definitely a miracle. We believe that God is and will always be with us wherever we go and whatever situation we have to face. He will not forsake us. He will carry us through.

I once heard from a very respectful Pastor speaking at the church that when our Lord Jesus told his disciples not to hinder the little children coming to Him, it was because the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. The Pastor then explained to us that under normal assumption, the disciples of Jesus would not have stopped any children if they were cute, clean and well behaved. The disciples most likely had stopped those children from getting close to Jesus because they were dirty, noisy, not good looking, exhibiting weird, uncontrollable and even unpredictable behaviour, or generally perceived as 'different' from a 'normal' kid. From Luke 18: 15-17 we learned that Jesus continued to tell his disciples that 'I tell you the truth, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.'

These children are 'special' because Jesus commanded us to be like them in order to enter His kingdom. Was it because of their weird appearances and behaviour or their unpredictable character?

I started to engage myself in the Special Needs Ministry six years ago. Looking after people with 'special needs' was not new to me because I have been doing a similar kind of job since my family migrated to Toronto 18 years ago. From this teaching of Jesus, I began to view my work as well as my ministry in the church from a different perspective. I am no longer seeing the people that I am helping or serving as 'people in-need', but I start to see them as the ones who will help me enter into the kingdom of God. I am seeing them as 'Jesus', the one who holds the key to His own kingdom, and not just treating them as my 'clients' or 'students'

I cannot claim that I have done much for these children and youth coming to our 'Special Needs' class. However, I can say that I have learned a lot from them through serving them every Sunday. I've learned from their 'innocence', 'genuineness', 'straight-

forwardness', 'sincerity' & their 'sensitivity to God'. Only at this stage I finally realize why Jesus told us in the Bible that unless we were to become as one of these children, we could not enter into His kingdom and it is very, very true!!!

I do hope that you could join me to serve 'Him' in this 'Special Needs' class and be able to have this 'key' to enter into the kingdom of God.

My older brother Matthew Leung has Down Syndrome and he is one of the greatest influences in my life. He is loving, caring, talented in music, loves to swim and play basketball. Growing up with Matthew was not exactly easy but it helped to build my character. Through him, I can see God's work and love so clearly.

Ever since I was young I knew Matthew was "different" and that he required more attention. If things didn't go his way he would throw a tantrum and sometimes my parents were forced to give in. I thought it was completely unfair and I became very frustrated. It was hard for me to accept and cope with my brother's needs. I would always think, "Matthew thinks he's king of the

world! He always gets what he wants! That's not fair!" When I was upset I would blame God for "ruining" my life but by His grace I gradually understood the situation and learned to care for Matthew.

When I grew older I faced a different kind of challenge. My friends went out more often and sometimes I couldn't join them because I had to take care of Matthew while my parents weren't home. I was mad and upset that I had to miss out but God granted me the maturity I needed to put others before me. Now, when my friends ask me to go out and I have to take care of Matthew, it's become much easier to explain and accept why I can't. Sometimes I find it hard to tell my friends that my brother has Down Syndrome. Some people aren't sure how to respond or act around him. It can be awkward but generally, people are nice to Matthew. Although it's not always easy to have Matthew as my brother, I love him dearly.

It's amazing to see God's work and love for His children in RHCCC. Our family started coming to RHCCC when I was about 5 years old and Matthew wasn't very social in his Sunday School Many mornings, it was a struggle to get him into the classroom as he felt uncomfortable but in time it slowly got better. His helpers and teachers were very patient and caring which helped comfort Matthew in the unfamiliar surroundings. God worked through members of the church to create a Sunday School class for children with special needs in September of 1998. The Special Sunday School class became a place where my brother felt very comfortable. The helpers became his friends and today, he acts as a big brother to the younger children. Over the years I've seen many positive changes in my brother since he has been in the Special Sunday School class. Now he has taken on responsibilities, shown leadership, become more sociable and happier. The Special Sunday School and S.P.E.C.I.A.L (a support group for parents) keep growing in numbers. It's amazing to see the Special Needs Ministry of RHCCC grow because it shows that more families have

found a place where their children can learn and worship God in an environment made just for them.

I'm very thankful that God has brought Matthew into my life. Through Matthew, God has developed my character and allowed me to serve Him. My parents always do their best to make sure both Matthew and I are content. They always tell me that they're thankful God brought me into their lives and Matthew's life which is really encouraging. No matter how hard life gets, God is always there and will never give us something we can't handle. He has a reason and purpose for everything. There is a reason Matthew is my brother, there's a reason each parent was given their child. I've witnessed and experienced God's love, mercy and grace in my life, my family, Matthew and the church. God loves all His children; He cares for every single one. The world may see my brother and others special needs children as weak, but God uses the weak to lead the strong.

Catherine Lo

When I was pregnant with my son, Sze Ka, my dream was that he would be smarter than my husband. When he was one year and three months old, I resigned from my job and stayed home to take care of him. I discovered that he was with special needs. When he was two years old, the test results came out that he had autistic tendency and was hyperactive. I suffered from insomnia. I slept for one to two hours and then cried through the night for years. It took the energy to look after ten normal kids to care for him. He would not quiet down for a minute. How much tears do I have to shed? How could I endure seasons after seasons? I collapsed both emotionally and physically and was suicidal throughout those years.

Upon immigration to Canada, I read an article that there must be a Creator for this immense universe. I started going to church. Later I heard a message on Ecclesiastes from Dr. Thomas

Leung and I read it many times. The explanation in this book of the Bible about life is so true, far better than any of the philosophical books I have ever read. I began to search for the true meaning of life, read the Bible and pray.

One night I was very sad and depressed about my son's behaviors. I opened the curtain in my bedroom and prayed, "Oh God! My son is an autistic kid. He cannot communicate with us. It is very hard to teach him. I feel very painful in my heart! People in the world do not acknowledge you. Are you as heart broken as I am? I heard God answer me. "Yes, I am!"

I read the Bible and it taught me that there was no need to worry about tomorrow, just do our best for today and it will be fine. Children are the inheritance that God has given to parents, who are like stewards. We just have to try our best to help our child. The fears that no one would take care of him after we died was gone. I began to sleep for three hours, four hours and eventually up to eight to ten hours each night. I am more relaxed now when I can sleep more. Jesus said in Matthew 11:28, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." From a very unhappy person, I have gradually found peace and joy in Jesus! Praise the Lord!

When I received my Diploma for High School completion in Canada, I was still a part-time bank teller. I prayed to God for many nights for a full time job. Then I heard God telling me, "I have a job for you. You do not have to look for it any more!" I heard this for many nights and thought that it was my imagination. So I prayed to God, "If it is you, please show me!" It felt like electricity going through my body. I was doubtful and asked again, "I am not sure, if it is you Lord, please show me again!" I felt the same electrical shock going through my body, just like what happened when I put my little finger into the electricity socket when I was small. When I woke up, I told my husband. He said, "You have been running around to look for a job for many days already. You better stop and get some rest."

Later I got an interview at a bank. After a few days, they called me for a second interview. I thought, "If I got \$18,000 per year as a teller, I will be very satisfied." A few days later, the personnel manager of the bank phoned me. She said they would hire me in the Safe Deposit Box Department. It was four thousand dollars a year more than the salary of a teller and was a more senior position. So I happily started to work there.

As I had to take care of my son and my health had not been good, I felt very tired at work. But I still tried my best. After working for six months, I heard from God again when I prayed to him at midnight, "You will get a promotion!" The next morning when I woke up, I told my husband about this and said, "Promotion? It will be great if I can pass my probation and do not get fired." But half a year later, my supervisor told me, "There is no need for you to stay in the Safe Deposit Box Department, you are promoted to a more senior position." After discussing about this with my husband, I decided to accept the offer with a raise of a few thousand dollars more.

As the new position required a lot of over-time work till 7:30 pm, it kept me very busy and stressful. My husband asked me not to stay over-time. It is very difficult for me to do so as there was really a lot of work to finish. I found his request to be a bit unusual. Then I realized my husband got Leukemia. We hugged and cried as if our marriage would end soon. Over ten times I prayed to God and said, "Lord, you know I am not able to bring up my son alone. I am a person with quick temper". Finally I heard God said, "You asked and I will give you!" The voice was very loud as if it was coming from heaven and echoed in my ears for many times. I woke up and told my husband again.

The doctor planned to have bone marrow transplant for my husband, Lemuel, and asked for tissue matching among his siblings. His older brother, Marcus, and younger sister, Ophelia, were in Canada, and both of them were a match. I was thankful that my Mother-in-law have six children and thought all of them

must match that for Lemuel. But actually his three siblings in Hong Kong and America were not a match.

Before the transplant, Dr. Lipton at Princess Margaret Hospital said both brothers were still young with good health; the success rate should be fairly high. I was a very nervous and worrisome person but after hearing this remark, I was full of hope and enthusiasm. Praise God that in spite of the difficult and windy road, eleven years had passed by, and the situation is improving. Even Lemuel is weaker after the transplant, at least his life was saved.

I learned in Job 1:21 that: "Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I will depart. The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; may the name of the LORD be praised." I do not care that much about success or failure now, but have gained the joy and peace in my heart. My son has also kept improving in his condition.

It is every parent's dream that his or her child can lead a successful life. We are no exception. When Philip, our older son was born in October 1984, I had a satisfying job with good income. I thought that I was going to sail through life effortlessly and began to have a happy family. However, things did not turn out as I thought. We noticed that Philip had some abnormal twitching when he was six months old. We and our family doctor did not think that it was a concern. The situation had become more severe. After a series of tests, Philip was diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy. He had to take medication to control the seizures. We were told

that he might have to suffer from seizures for the rest of his life. In addition, he might never be able to sit up or walk. There was a list of what he might never be able to do just like announcement of death penalty for us. We felt hopeless and helpless. We tried to live our lives as usual, but we had no joy. My wife and I often got into fights.

In May 1990, happily but fearfully, we welcomed our second son, Jason. After a series of tests, it was confirmed that Jason was a perfectly healthy boy. That was a sign of relief for both of us and we started to put our hope in this new life.

In the summer of 1992, we were on our family trip driving long distance to Vancouver. Kitty's sister lent us an audiotape, which was a testimony of a medical doctor and her son with Autism. Since we were trapped in the car for a long time, we finished listening to the tape but I did not pay much attention to it. When we came back from the trip, Kitty's sister invited her to church. Kitty started taking the two boys to the church in cabs. In 1994, Kitty was baptized. I was still using different kinds of excuses not to go with them. I thought that I had everything in control. All I needed to do was to make more money. I did not need the church and I don't believe in God. Looking back, I knew I had made a big mistake and I was like a lost sheep. As noted in Matthew 12:26, "What good will it be for a man if he gains the whole world, yet forfeits his soul? Or what can a man give in exchange for his soul?" But God had not given up on me. I knew that it was hard for Kitty to travel in cabs with the two boys, so I started going to church with them in 1996. On Easter in 1997, I was baptized. Therefore, Easter means a lot more to me as I was born again on the same day. Hallelujah!

Amazingly, shortly after Kitty had gone to church, Philip had fewer seizures. Therefore he was allowed to reduce his medication. Currently, Philip does not need any medication and have not had any seizure for over ten years. Without the side effects from the medication, Philip has regained some of his ability

to learn. Although his intelligence is still behind, he can at least walk and climb up stairs. It has lifted a big load from our shoulders. Hallelujah!

The first church we joined was a small church. As Jason grew older as a quiet boy, he did not get much support from this church with very few teenagers. We worried that his spiritual development will be affected. Also we were the only family with a child with special needs and there was no support in this area for us. We learned that RHCCC offered a very good youth fellowship, and so we left our old church and join RHCCC. Soon afterwards, Jason settled well and made a lot of new church friends. Currently he serves on the Worship Team for the Youth Sunday Service. He is now more open and joyful. Hallelujah!

By the introduction of a sister, we got to know a brother serving in the SPECIAL parent support group and was invited to the group. In the beginning of 2006, we joined the SPECIAL gathering for the first time. Ever since then, we have been actively participating in the meetings. Later we started to serve in this group as a core leader responsible for providing care and support to a few other families. This Parent Support group is led by a caring and loving pastor, and has the support of other pastors. We are most thankful to the brother and sisters who act as caregivers for the parents as well as those who look after our children. They could have enjoyed their own life. But they sacrificed their weekends and come to church to watch our children while we are in the monthly SPECIAL meeting. Their willingness to serve and to love the "special" children and care for us as parents with "special" children is a great reflection of the unconditional and unending love from our Heavenly Father. May He reward them and bless them abundantly.

The joy in our hearts grows when we continue to serve. It is my desire to spread the good news to all my friends, especially to those with children with special needs. I will share God's love with

them and encourage them to accept Jesus as their Savior so that the curses are turned into blessings.

I thank God for our children. They have parents who love

God to love them, they have not give up on their children just as God does not give up on His children. May God's kingdom be expanded, the good news spread to the end of the world, all the peoples be saved and His name be glorified. God's grace is too beautiful



I am a mother of two boys. Philip, my elder son, is 23 years old and he suffers from severe Cerebral Palsy. Jason, the younger one, is 17 years old.

Before I came to know Jesus, I had low self-esteem and was always withdrawn. I experienced a lot of failure at school including demotion and being expelled from school. I started working before I could finish my secondary school education. I was always seeking the value for my life. I thought that marriage could bring me out of the "slump" in my life. In 1983, I came to Canada and got married. But sadly Philip was found to have Cerebral Palsy when he was six months' old. He depended heavily on the medication, but still suffered plenty of pain brought on by the seizures. I watched him suffer and felt so helpless. I cried and cried daily and became numb to my feelings.

Due to his illness, the progress of his learning was really slow. He could not sit up until he was three years old. I could not

help but worry about his future. How many more years could I stick around to teach and take care of him? I spent my days in fear and sorrow.

In 1990, Jason was born as a healthy boy. He did bring joy to our family. However, it also meant that my burden in providing care to the family got even heavier.

In 1993, my month-in-law came to live with us. We had problem getting along and our relationship was tense. I was living under pressure and in pain. With my sister's invitation, I started going to church with the boys, with Philip in wheelchair, riding in cabs for the handicapped.

God touched my heart with His love. In 1994, I repented and accepted Jesus as my Savior and got baptized. I had started praying for Philip's pain and asked for God's healing. Amazingly, it was about this time, Philip's seizures started to happen less frequently. Doctors began to cut down his medication. By the end of 1995, Philip was totally off all medication and had no more seizures.

Praise God for healing Philip's seizure and for curing the pain in my heart. As my gratitude towards God, I sold my jewelry, including those I got for my wedding, and offered all of them to God on Christmas day in 1995 with the approval of husband, who was a unbeliever then. I decided to let Jesus to lead me for the rest of my life. God has blessed my whole family. With God's grace, my relationship with my mother-in-law was becoming better and better. We learned to accept each other. In 1997, my husband accepted Jesus followed by my mother-in-law in 2000.

In 2005, God led our family to RHCCC. We joined the SPECIAL parent support group and have experienced love and mutual support. The ministry is well supported by the church. The commitment and care from the pastors, brothers and sisters in

Christ have revealed God's love to us. I am thankful and happy to be part of and serve in this group.

In October 2005, Philip turned 21 years old and was officially out of school or any government funding. I had to take care of him on a full time basis. I got worried and exhausted. Thanks to God, in my devotion and God used His Words to encouraged and remind me: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men." Colossians 3:23. I felt all my burden were gone. I surrendered to spend my days taking care of Philip willingly and joyfully.

In October 2006, the government started a new support program. Philip was accepted into this program. Now he goes to the Day Program twice a week, which provides him with one-on-one support and joined different activities including swimming.

Praise God that His grace is so beautiful. He always provides a way for me wherever I go and whatever challenge I face. He turned me into a positive and cheerful person because of His love and I am His precious daughter. I have also found the best gift for my sons – God's love and the hope of eternal life.

Philip is still severely challenged. Physically, he has grown up to be an adult but he is still like a baby who needs to be cared for. Life is full of challenge and requires a lot of hardwork – it is bitter. However, with God walking by our side, life becomes full of peace and joy – it is sweet. As it is written in Matthew 11:28, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

May those who are heavy burdened come to know Jesus and walk with God, which will bring the biggest blessing of all.

My wife died of cancer four years ago. I brought my sons, ages 7 and 11, back to Canada. My older son is autistic. He is non-verbal and needs round the clock personal care from others. That was the lowest point in my life but praise the Lord that I found His love when I was in distress.

I got to know God's love

Then God provided me with the opportunity to hear the good news. It helped me to reflect on my life. As noted in Micah 6:8 "...O man, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with you God". The biggest difference that sets Christian apart from other religions is "Love" and "Mercy". Because of this "Love", I accepted Jesus as my Savior and my Lord.

I learned about God's love

In the past few years, I learned about God's love. I learned how to appreciate the strength of others and accept their weaknesses, rather than criticizing their shortcoming. Take my sons as an example. Even they are facing different challenges, I learned to appreciate them, and not to focus on their inabilities. In spite of being autistic and non-verbal, my older son has a kind heart. He likes to be around people. He always wears his smiling face. Therefore a lot of people really like him. My younger son has big round eyes. He is an honest person. People like him a lot, too. He also has good memory and strong math skills. All of them are gifts from God.

After praying for several days, I decided to go. When I first got up to speak, I was very nervous. However I was burdened to speak for these families as the services for people with special needs are lacking substantially. I started talking with my trembling voice. After a while, I became calmer. Then I started speaking from the

bottom of my heart. I had the courage to say all that I had to say. After my speech, the Minister came to me and thanked me for speaking for the families. Other people also came to give me encouraging words. They also asked me about the family group that I represented.

However after I have calm down, I realize all I have to spend is an hour or so with these children once a week. If this is affecting me to want to quit, what about their parents? I have really not done much as compared to them. Because of love, they take care of their children 24x7. I learned from these parents to treat these children as my own and use my best effort to help them. Then I have the joy to continue serving in this ministry. I pray that God will give me more love to serve them.

Sometimes I ask God why does he allow "autism" to occur on earth. His words come to me: "Now we see but a poor reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known." 1 Corinthians 13:12.

What we know is indeed limited. Three years ago, my daughter was 3 years old, and all of a sudden, her left body became un-coordinated. She could not ride a bike and had hard time walking up the stairs. She could not even use her left hand to put on her mittens. After assessment by four doctors at the Sick Kid Hospital, they could not find out what exactly went wrong with her

and did not know how to treat her. She needed support for her daily routines. The church, my fellowship and my cell group were all praying diligently for her. After seven months' continuous prayer, she recovered amazingly. No specialist could explain it. But God knows everything. Therefore "do not give up".

After years of training and treatment, Carly Fleishman, a 13-years-old girl in the States, has learned to use computer to communicate with others. She wrote this message: "I would tell them never to give up on the children that they work with." Possibly this is what every autistic child want to tell their parents and their therapists, and also an encouragement for us as caregivers.

What we can do is as limited as what we know. However what I can offer on a Sunday is to spend a couple of hours with these special children and let their parents worship God without disturbance and without worrying about their children. I believe that this is pleasing to God.

I was touched by the booklet of testimonies prepared by the SPECIAL group three years ago. A year later I stepped out of my comfort zone and learned to serve in this ministry. I am thankful that I have the opportunity to share with you in this Volume 2 the joy that I have gained from the service. I pray to God that through these testimonies, more brothers and sisters will be inspired join us to serve in this meaningful ministry.

Two years ago, I relapsed into depression. I could not pull myself off from the couch. I did not have the energy to do anything and couldn't even sing praises to God in worship or fellowship. It was such a heart-wrenching feeling. I was blessed to have my prayer partner who kept praying for my healing during these days of darkness. Amazingly, after attending the "Louis Program" with my wife, I was totally released from the depressed mood that very weekend. I could be back to church with a thankful heart to worship God. Praise the Lord. Hallelujah! We have to learn to always count God's blessings so that we can remain faithful with God's promise during difficult times: "The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor

forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged." Deuteronomy 31:8.

It's been 3 years since we last collected testimonies and put them together to count God's blessings. Everyone who is involved in the Special Needs Ministry continues to experience God's abundance in the lives of the families. This includes:

- Over 15 new families joined our SPECIAL group since May 2005.
- Four more sisters joined us, forming a team of 7 Caregivers for the parents.
- A few more new caregivers for students were recruited into our Sunday Teaching and Support Team.
- 45 parents or volunteers joined the "Louis Program" training offered by Yolanda Wong from Australia in 2006 and the Toronto Louis Program Parent Support Centre was formed as a follow up ministry. A miniconcert by our children was presented during the "Continuation of Blessings" evangelistic meeting. Praise God that 10 people accepted Christ in these events.
- Brothers and sisters from Paul Fellowship continue to provide childcare service when parents are meeting for their Support Group, and support the annual Christmas celebration that has grown to an attendance of close to 150 people in 2007.
- Our first SPECIAL retreat for parents was held in July 2007 with 7 couples attending. 10 couples have registered for the 2008 retreat to be held in mid-May.

- A team of fathers worked together to renovate the church old nursery into two classrooms for our Special Needs class and other church users, with a small room to be converted into a multi-sensory room.
- Establishment of a prayer blog and a resource blog to strengthen our prayer network and sharing of resources.
- First official sibling group met in early May 2008.
- **↓** Volume 2 of our collection of testimonies is completed.

Praising God for

- Parents who find hope in the Lord to stand firm in their faith to bring up their children and continue to reach out to other families.
- Siblings who stand by their parents to love and look after their brother or sister who are different but equally valued by God.

- Caregivers for Children who trust in the Lord for wisdom to minister to the group of students with special needs every Sunday with love, acceptance and patience.

- All our SPECIAL children for having taught us so much about our gracious and merciful God.

Around 7 years ago, I noticed a few boys in church with strange behavior. They liked to hide underneath the tables. Occasionally when they came near the other children, they would scare them off. It was then when the Lord opened my eyes to see His infinite amazing love for some special families.

For he has not despised or disdained the suffering of the afflicted one; he has not hidden his face from him but has listened to his cry for help. Psalms 22:24

Let me share about how God answers our prayers and leads us on in the past few years:

Pray for courage and wisdom to care for those children with special needs?

God's answer:

Provision of 3 sisters to start a special Sunday class in September 1998 for a few boys with Down syndrome.

➤ Having been in the special class for around 6 months with the teachers, these boys started to accept us as their friends, and were comfortable coming to church. We asked God how we could include them in regular classes so that they would not be "isolated", and that our other children would learn to be friends with those who were different from them

God's answer:

Provision of more caregivers so that we could arrange for these children to join regular classes with one-on-one support in April 1999. With every new child God brought to RHCCC, He rarely delays in providing a caregiver.

➤ By having their children being cared for, parents were able to have a peaceful time to worship God on Sundays. What else could be done to have their burden shared by the body of Christ? We started to pray for the possibility of forming a support group for these parents in May 2000.

God's answer:

A brother, whose son has special needs, had changed from a job that required a lot of traveling to another one based in Toronto. He joyfully agreed to be the Coordinator of the long-awaited Parent Support Group that met for the first time on October 20, 2001. There were a total of 8 families.

➤ God brought more children with special needs to our church and the Parent Support Group grew to include 17 families by mid-2002. We prayed for God's provision of more helpers to take care of the children while their parents were meeting.

God's answer:

Starting from early 2002, brothers and sisters from Paul and Peter Fellowships take turn to look after the children every third Saturday afternoon of each month. They continue their commitment faithfully till now. A few sisters, who are Music Therapist or Art Therapist, also volunteered to lead the children in music and art activities for a few times.

➤ The demands in supporting these families were rising. We asked God how to proceed further?

God's answer:

- 4 families agreed to form a Core Group on November 22, 2002. They would set direction for the development of the Parent Support Group and plan for the monthly programs. One more family was added to the Core Group in August 2003 and two more in early 2005, making a total of 7 families. Starting from January 2005, they even handle the arrangement of childcare helpers with Paul and Peter Fellowships.
- With friendship being developed, network being established in sharing resources, and troubled hearts being lifted up by words of encouragement from each other, the foundation of fellowship in the Lord was strengthened. What else then could be the bridge to connect the members to a close personal relationship with God, the One who is able to lead them on to face life challenges?

God's answer:

Those families that did not belong to a fellowship formed a small group to join the 40 Days of Purpose campaign towards the end of 2002. On completion of the 6 Bible studies, this group continues to meet as a LTG (Life Transformation Group) in January 2003. Praise the Lord that one member accepted Christ on August 6, 2003. Within 2004, 6 brothers and sisters from the Parent Support Group were baptized.

When the children joined the Children Sunday School summer program in the previous years, they were very nervous with the new format. What could we do to maintain a routine for them this coming summer? With the new year term in September approaching, it would not be safe for the older ones to travel to the Bayview School to join the Junior High Sunday School.

God's answer:

A team of teachers and caregivers were recruited to start a special Sunday class as from July 2003 during noon service. The curriculum and format were designed at the children's level of understanding. For those parents who join Morning service and prefer to have their child join regular Children and Youth Worship, their child will be cared for by one caregiver. We have over 20 dedicated teachers or caregivers serving with us on Sundays.

Some of the siblings of these special needs children might be ignored as their parents may have paid more attention to the other child with special needs. How can we offer them support? We started praying for them through our daily email prayer network in August 2002.

God's answer:

We invited a few siblings to join a small group, which is a follow up support group for children from divorced or bereaved families after completion of the S.P.R.I.N.G (Single Parent-&-Kids Renewed IN God) program in 2004. With the help of the Group Leaders, children support each other to deal with losses in life and are learning to find new hope in God.

➤ With over 8 children and youth with special needs in a class, it can be fairly challenging when they are not cooperating. Lord, how can we help our coworkers not to get frustrated and remain committed and excited to serve this group?

God's answer:

We were introduced to one non-profit organization specialized in providing services to people with disability. They are prepared to offer us a series of training.

➤ The Parent Support Group has grown to 23 families by early 2005. Apart from teachers and caregivers for the children, we also need non-parent members and LTG leaders to help the Parent Support Group. How can we get more people joining us to serve these families and create an environment of love and acceptance in our church?

God's answer:

Some church members did give support, e.g. a small group from Enoch Fellowship invited the families to camping in June 2003. They served them food and other needs so that these families could enjoy their first ever camping. Paul Fellowship volunteered to do the set up, prepare food and look after the children in the 2004 Christmas celebration. The Lord also put the idea of organizing a Ministry "Open House" to bring awareness of special needs ministry among the church congregation in May.

➤ While we have not done much to make the availability of our special needs ministry known to the community, it is clearly God's will for us to reach out to other unchurched families raising children with special needs. They should hear the gospel and accept Jesus as the Lord of their lives. What is God's plan for us next?

God's answer:

God has been faithful in leading us to serve these families and since 1998 and has been providing all our needs abundantly. He has been opening doors and leading us all the way. As evidenced in the testimonies in this booklet, everyone involved in this ministry has been blessed to be a blessing. We can all testify God's goodness and greatness in our lives as we witness His turning curses into blessings.


